The other Trustees have done a great job submitting their monthly articles, so this month I will include another article from one of the Senior Wolcott Fellows we met at the Selection Board Meeting in March at George Washington University.

Article provided by Chris Conrad, Senior Wolcott Fellow:

Whenever I'm asked, it's always difficult for me to fully articulate the tremendous impact of the Wolcott



Fellowship on my life. Most concisely stated, the Program has enabled me to serve national economic and security interests pursuant to the public good in ways I could never have imagined prior to accepting the Grant.

Also important to note is the Program's role in granting access to industry-leading thinkers in the classroom, unparalleled career development resources, and the reputation of one of the finest international affairs programs in the world.

In my view, the greatest overall value of the Wolcott Foundation is that it continues to successfully equip promising young people with the resources required for them to actualize their visions for national advancement. Without the Wolcott's unwavering commitment to supporting those who have the aptitude and desire to work on the international stage, I would not be the person I am today. I would not be in the position to strengthen our

nation's technological competitiveness; I would not be challenged to do great and creative things on a daily basis; and,perhaps most importantly, I would not have met my wife at the Elliott School - the love of my life.

I am currently employed as an Engagement Manager at the Avascent Group, a boutique consultancy with a dedicated focus on government-driven sectors.
