

MEMORIAL DAY

Every May, we celebrate Memorial Day. But what does Memorial Day signify? Sadly enough, there are those who believe it is the unofficial start to summer; the first Bar-B-Que of the year, just another three-day weekend, and a big sale day at the stores, schools will soon be closing for the summer vacation, the opening of swimming pools, etc. Yes, all of this happens on Memorial Day.

But Memorial Day really honors the men and women who made the supreme sacrifice – they gave their lives for their country when their country called them. It is a very solemn day that should be set aside to remember and honor those who fought and died to maintain the freedoms we now enjoy that is unmatched anywhere in this world.

If it wasn't for these brave men and women, I shudder to think what life would

be like under an oppressive ruler. The location of the first observance of Memorial Day is in dispute. Some claim the custom of honoring war dead began in Boalsburg, Pennsylvania. Others claim the custom was originated by some Southern women who placed flowers on the Graves of both Union and Confederate soldiers after the Civil War. According to one writer, the first Memorial Day service took place on May 30, 1866, on Belle Isle, a burial ground for Union soldiers in the St. James River, at Richmond, Virginia.

The school superintendent and the mayor planned the program of hymns and speeches and had the burial ground decorated with flowers. In 1865, Henry C. Welles, a druggist in the village of Waterloo, NY, mentioned at a social Gathering that honor should be shown to the patriotic dead of the Civil War by decorating their graves.

In the spring of 1866, he again mentioned this subject to General John B. Murray, Seneca County Clerk. General Murray embraced the idea and a committee was formulated to plan a day devoted to honoring the dead. In May of 1966, just in time for the Centennial, Waterloo was recognized as the Birthplace of Memorial Day by the United States Government. This recognition was long in coming and involved hours of painstaking research to prove the claim. While other Communities may claim earlier observances of honoring the Civil War dead, none can claim to have been so well planned and complete, nor can they claim the continuity of observances that Waterloo can that had honored soldiers who had died in the Civil War.

Regardless of who was involved and where the first observance was, it is more important to remember whom we honor and why. This year and every year – Remember and honor. By Dan M. Williams, member of the Villages High Twelve Club #674, Lady Lake, Florida. All gave some; Some gave all!



Northwest Masonic Club No. 769 Minutes April 23, 2019: Our meeting at the Red Apple Restaurant on April 23, 2019 enjoyed Brother Vytautas (Vyts) Paukstys presentation on Children's Dyslexia Center of Metropolitan Chicago. As Chairman of the Board of Governors, Brother Vyts explained the origin of the national organization and Chicago's startup at our previous LaGrange Children's Home (1999).

Funding was Brother Vyts emphasis as they are supported by a 3.5 million dollar Endowment fund but leaving \$100,000 per year to be raised. Funds needed are \$5,000 per year per student and we have forty students in a two year program. Seventy-five students are awaiting enrollment and presently on twenty graduate each year. Students and Tudors are being trained with some Tudors coming from public schools who perform in school awareness program and Tudors used in Dyslexia LaGrange (Baptist) and now Palatine school (Methodist). Illinois Masonic Advocate Hospital is in the future for a school. Over thirty percent of the funding is received in the May 18, 2019 WALKK 5K Run being held at Scottish Temple, Bloomsdale, IL.

Anna Gillingham (1878-1963), compiled and published instructional materials as early as the 1930s which provided the foundation for student instruction and teacher training in what became known as the Orton-Gillingham Approach. In the hands of a well-trained and experienced instructor, it is a powerful tool of exceptional breadth, depth, and flexibility using one-on-one teacher-student instructional model. Reading, spelling and writing difficulties have been the dominant focus of the Approach although it has been successfully adapted for use with students who exhibit difficulty with mathematics.
